The National Institutes of Health indicates that the death rate from colorectal cancer could be reduced by more than 80% if people over 50 or with a family history of colorectal cancer were screened.

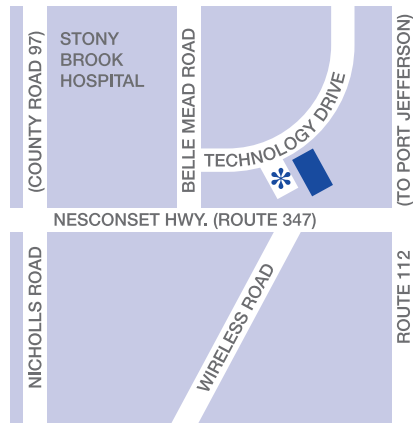

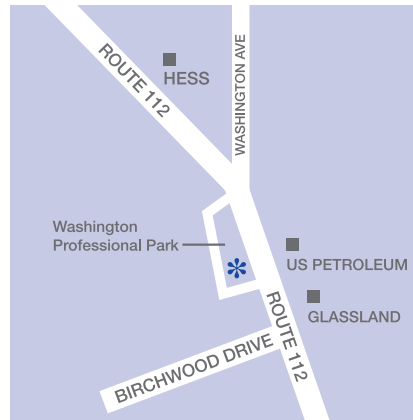

Colorectal Cancer – What is it?

Colorectal cancer is a disease in which abnormal cells in the colon or rectum divide uncontrollably, ultimately forming a malignant tumor. The colon is the large intestine and the rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus. Most colon cancers develop first as polyps, which are abnormal growths inside the colon or rectum that could later become cancerous.

Colorectal Cancer – What are the symptoms?

Symptoms of colorectal cancer are numerous and nonspecific. They include: weakness, shortness of breath, change in bowel habits, narrow stools, diarrhea or constipation, red or dark blood in stool, weight loss, abdominal pain, cramps, or bloating. Other conditions such as irritable bowel syndrome (spastic colon), ulcerative colitis, Crohn's disease, diverticulosis, and peptic ulcer disease can have symptoms that mimic colorectal cancer. Screening is vitally important since colorectal polyps, that could later become cancerous, generally do not cause any symptoms.

Colorectal Cancer – Who does it impact?

Colon cancer is the third most common form of cancer in the United States, and the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths. Colorectal cancer affects women and men of all ethnic and racial groups, and is most often found in people 50 years or older. On average, Americans have a 1-in-20 risk of developing colorectal cancer, but that risk can be increased by other factors. It is estimated that this year, more than 50,000 people will die of colon cancer. If everyone 50 years or older had regular screening, more than 80% of deaths from colon cancer could be prevented.

Colorectal Cancer – Why should I be screened?

This is an important question to ask. Colorectal cancer is **highly preventable**; screening can save your life. Screening with a colonoscopy can detect precancerous polyps and allows them to be removed **before they become cancerous**. Colonoscopy can also find colon cancer at an early stage, and treatment of early stage colon cancer often leads to a cure.

Colonoscopy – What is it?

Colonoscopy is the most comprehensive test for detection of colon polyps or cancer. A colonoscope is inserted through the rectum into the colon and examines the entire length of the colon and rectum. There is a video camera at the end of the colonoscope connected to a display monitor so the doctor can see and examine the inside of the colon. Special instruments can be passed through the colonoscope to biopsy any suspicious-looking areas or remove polyps.
